CONICAL HILL

IS B AMATUTSHANE PAN TD shows the uVe regiment outflanking move once they exited the Qwabi valley the job of the horns was to outflank both sides of the enemy force at the same time and to trap the enemy body within, both horns meeting behind the camp. As we have already determined the right horn was noticed by Colonel Pulleine and he then sent Lieutenant Melville to bring in E and F company's this new force of Zulu's was unnoticed by Lieut Essex proving that this massive Zulu force was stationed on the upper banks of the Manzimyama stream. So the left horn which comprised of the inGabamakosi and uVe regiments was stationed between end of the Ngwebeni valley and behind Nyezi hill and when gunfire was heard which came from the discovery location this can be confirmed by a warrior of the uVe regiment **"Some of the enemy then came out of Isandlwana and we were told of that by our spies. On hearing that, we said we were not going to sit still on our mats, so we got up and after going about a mile we came up against them , on a flat bit of country near a small stream"** [1] notice he says they met Colonel Durnfords force after going about a mile the very location can be confirmed by Jabez Molife map who was with Colonel Durnford when they collided with the uVe regiment this small stream presently is a massive dried up donga its location can be confirmed from my Panorama from Qwabi hill then if you go back 1 mile this will take you to the rear of Nyezi hill this is where I place the concealed location of the Left horn. So when the gunfire prompted the left horn to advance they entered the Qwabi valley then one mile down collides with Durnfords force of two troops of NNH, this forcing Colonel Durnford back to the camp stopping and making stands in the dongas as he returns, this donga in this pan is the second last Donga he stops at, it is from here he discovers the rocket battery just been knock out by the screen covering the discovery location . Lieutenant Scott commander of the Natal Carbineers who was stationed on Amatutshane joined up with Colonel Durnfords force and then moved to the last donga so lets go to Trooper Barker testimony **"Heavy firing was then heard on our Left, and being fired on we returned the fire, posting ourselves in a donga we saw the rocket battery cut up. We were obliged to retire, but at every cover we dismounted and fired. We would then be about two and a half miles from camp. We retired slowly, never allowing the Zulus to come closer than two or three hundred yards of us. As some of us had nearly expended our ammunition we retired to camp for more, and saw as we retired soldiers being dispatched in skirmishing order, to the extreme left, some companies being nearly two miles from camp. Arriving at camp we found our quartermaster and sergeant busy opening ammunition boxes and serving it out to all who asked for it . Poor London the quartermaster, had been struck by a stray bullet, but not badly wounded. As we left the camp Col Durnford rode up to us, Carbineers hurry up and follow me we followed him to a donga about a mile from the camp."** [2] This donga the Natal Carbineers found themselves in is between amaTUTSHANE and the Notch it is from this donga they witness the end of the rocket battery, soon after this Colonel Durnford orders the Carbineers to follow him to cut of the left horn which will be Colonel Durnfords final donga before retiring to the camp.

IS B AMATUTSHANE PAN TD [1] this Panorama confirms what Trooper Barker said previously showing the advance of Lonsdale company and A company to support Durnford in the Donga lets go to Private Malindi of Lonsdale's Company who first was to arrive near Amatutshane **"immediately afterwards another company came up to support us, while we were beginning to fire at the Zulu at almost 600 or 700yards distance"**[3] Private Bickley of A Company also confirms **"The Mounted Police and our company 1/24th was sent out after this in support of Colonel Durnford's party. The guns firing at the enemy in this direction appeared to have great effect, and soon after it began they made a retreat but afterwards they reappeared in extended order coming over the rise to the left front and near the conical hill "**[4] also Private Williams who was Colonel Glyn's groom confirms the following **"Number 1 Company 1/24th was now sent out in support of Colonel Durnford and the guns of the artillery commenced firing on the Zulus as they came down the hills to our left and left front with great effect and the Zulus began to retreat behind the hill Colonel Durnford had gone around his party having commenced to retire on its supports"**[5].⁴ This clearly states the inGabamakosi regiment moving down the notch and moving behind Amatutshane to escape the fire of the guns and from hear they followed Colonel Durnford to his final Donga.
